Confirmed keynote speakers



Carlos Reis was born in 1950 in the Azores. He is the Rector of The Universidade Aberta in Lisbon, and professor at the University of Coimbra. From 1998 to 2002 he was the director of the National Library in Lisbon. He is the author of 15 books and over 70 articles published in Portugal, Brazil, Spain, the United States and Germany, and has taught at several universities in Europe, the United States and Brazil.



Mariano Gago, ComSE, the present Minister for Science, Technology and Higher Education in Portugal, graduated at the Instituto Superior Técnico in Lisbon, and did advanced research work in Paris at the École Polytechnique as a high-energy physicist. Professor of Physics at Instituto Superior Técnico in Lisbon, he worked at CERN (European Nuclear Research Organisation) in Geneva for several years. He was a member of the CERN Council (1985-1990), the EC Joint Research Centre Board of Governors (1986-1989), President of the Portuguese National Board for Science and Technology (1986-1989), and was chair of the European EUREKA initiative from July 1997 to June 1998. Prof. Gago has been Minister for Science and Technology of Portugal.



Armando Rocha-Trindade is presently in charge of the 1st cycle HE program on Communication and Multimedia at Universidade Lusíada (Portugal). Armando Trindade graduated in Telecommunications and Electronics Engineering (Lisbon, 1961) and got a "Doctorat d'Etat" in Physics (1970), at the Faculty of Sciences of Paris (Orsay). He became Full Professor of Physics at the Lisbon Technical University. He was Director-General of Higher Education and Director-General in charge of different portfolios in the Ministry of Education (1975 – 1988). He was the founding President of the Universidade Aberta (the Portuguese Open University) from1988 to 1998.

Armando Trindade has been very active in the international and European scene, being a member of the European Commission High Level Expert Group on the Societal Consequences of the Information Society. He was a founding member of the European Association of the Distance Teaching Universities and of the European Distance Education Network, of which he is now a lifetime member. He was President of the International Council for Distance Education (ICDE) from 1995 to 1999, having then been nominated President Emeritus of this Council.

He is the author of several books and more than one hundred articles in international scientific journals, on issues related to distance education systems organisation and on educational communication.



David Vincent is Professor of Social History and Pro Vice-Chancellor (Strategy Planning and External Affairs) at The Open University (UK). He holds responsibilities for funding council and governmental liaison, the University's strategic development, for liaison with national funding bodies and for international policy. Prior to this appointment he was successively lecturer, senior lecturer and professor in history, Dean of Humanities and Deputy Vice-Chancellor at Keele University. From 1994-2003 he had responsibility for the University's academic strategy. He is a Visiting Fellow of Kellogg College, Oxford and President of the European Association of Distance Teaching Universities.

He is the author or editor of fifteen books and numerous articles on British and European social history.



Jonathan Kydd is Dean of the University of London External System. Prior to this, he was Professor of Agricultural Development Economics and Director of the Distance Learning Programme at Imperial College London.His research and teaching have been mainly on agricultural, rural and food policy issues in poorer countries, principally Africa but also Asia and Latin America. He spent eight years researching and teaching at the University of Malawi.

Jonathan is a board member of CDC Group plc, a UK Government-owned investment company charged with stimulating private capital flows to poorer countries. He recently stepped down from chairing the board of NR International Ltd., a research management company owned by a consortium of universities. He has been Special Advisor to the International Development Select Committee of the UK House of Commons.



Uwe Schimank was born 1955 in Bielefeld (Germany). Studied sociology at the university of Bielefeld 1974-1979. 1979 diploma, 1981 Dr. rer. soc. at Bielefeld. 1985-1996 researcher at the Max-Planck-Institut für Gesellschaftsforschung, Köln. Since 1996 professor of sociology at the FernUniversität in Hagen. Since 2002 vice-rector responsible for issues of teaching, studies, and professional education.



Janerik Lundquist is associate professor at Linköping University, Sweden and the chairman of the International Committee of the Swedish Agency for Networks and Cooperation in Higher Education (NSHU). He fulfils several appointments within the ICDE (International Council for Open and Distance Education) and is member of the Executive Committee of EADTU.



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Fred Mulder is Rector of Open Universiteit Nederland (OUNL) since September 2000. He has a chair as Professor in Informatics Education at OUNL since 1991, after having started to work at OUNL in its pioneering years in 1983. From 1993 till 1996 he was Dean of the School of Engineering. In 1998 he left OUNL for the Business School of Universiteit Twente (until Sept. 2000).

Mulder holds degrees in Chemical Engineering (BSc), Applied Mathematics (MSc Engineering) and Theoretical Chemistry (PhD). In 1979-1980 he worked as a Postdoc in Theoretical Chemistry at University of Western Ontario (London, Ontario, Canada). In 1997-1998 he was for a five-month Sabbatical Leave at the College of Computing of Georgia Tech (Atlanta, Georgia, USA).

Mulder is on the Executive Committee of EADTU (European Association of Distance Teaching Universities) since 2002, and leading a National Initiative on Lifelong Learning since 2005. In the academic year 2007/2008 he will be the Chair of the Dutch University Rector's Conference, while currently he is chairing the Task Forces on Open Educational Resources of both EADTU and ICDE.



Pekka Kess is professor and head of the department of Industrial Engineering and Management at the University of Oulu, Finland. He is in charge of the research and education of production management and related topics. He was graduated as an engineer in 1976 and became Dr of Science (Engineering) in 1992. He also holds a MSc degree in computer systems. Before the academic career he gained production and R&D experience from heavy chemical, basic metal, electronics and software industries at managerial and executive levels. He has gained international experience by working in industry in the US and in the UK in addition to Finland. He has worked with ICT systems and solutions for 30 years in various types of industries and organisations. Especially usage of ICT in business process improvement and reengineering has been very important issue on the agenda.

Professor Kess's research areas are strategic management, knowledge management,

quality management and eLearning. He has an extensive experience from EU collaboration projects as project evaluator, project coordinator and project manager. He has been also working for several years to promote distance education and eLearning to universities. He is member of the board and executive committee as well as the chairman of the Quality Assurance task force of EADTU (European Association of Distance Teaching Universities). His list of publications includes over 70 articles in scientific journals and international conferences.



Francesc Pedró, Senior policy analyst and principal administrator of the Centre for Educational Research and Innovation (CERI), Directorate for Education, OECD, is currently working on the following projects: Radical Innovations in Learning: The Mexican experience, and National Reviews of Educational R&D: Switzerland. He is also preparing a set of activities dealing with ICT in education and particularly the emergence of the New Millenium Learner.

Francesc studied at Med (Autonomous University of Barcelona), he has a PhD in Comparative Education (UNED, Madrid), and did a postdoc in Comparative Education at the University of London Institute of Education). Francesc was formerly professor of comparative education and public policy at the Pompeu Fabra University (Barcelona) and academic director of its program for educational quality. Prior to that, pro-vicechancellor of educational research and innovation at the Open University of Catalonia (Barcelona).



Tony Bates was the Executive Director, Research, Strategic Planning, and Information Technology at the Open Learning Agency of British Columbia From 1990 to 1995. Prior to that, he was Professor of Educational Media Research at the British Open University, where he worked for 20 years as one of the founding members of staff. He was Director of Distance Education and Technology in the Continuing Studies Division of the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, Canada from 1995 to 2003 and also Research Team Leader of MAPLE, the Centre for Research into Managing and Planning Learning Environments in Education at UBC. He is on the editorial board of six journals specializing in distance education and educational technology. Tony Bates is President and CEO of Tony Bates Associates Ltd, a private company specializing in consultancy and training in the planning and management of e-learning and distance education. He is also part-time Chair of Research into e-Learning at the Open University of Catalonia in Barcelona, Spain. He is also on the Academic Advisory Board of the Volkswagen Auto Uni, based in Germany. He is the author of nine books. His research groups at the UKOU, OLA and UBC published over 350 papers in the area of distance education and the use of technology for teaching.



Sir John Daniel became President of the Commonwealth of Learning (COL) in 2004 after gaining wide international experience in universities and the United Nations system. He obtained his full-time university education in Metallurgy at Oxford and Paris and later demonstrated his commitment to lifelong learning by taking 25 years to complete a part-time Master's degree in Educational Technology at Concordia University. However, the internship for that programme, which took him to the UK Open University in 1972, was a life-changing experience. He saw the future of higher education and wanted to be part of it. This quest took him on an international odyssey with appointments at the Télé-université (Directeur des Études, 1973-77), Athabasca University (Vice-President for Learning Services, 1978-80), Concordia University (Vice-Rector, Academic, 1980-84), Laurentian University (President, 1984-90), the UK Open University (Vice-Chancellor, 1990-2001) and UNESCO (Assistant Director-General for Education, 2001-04). His non-executive appointments have included the presidencies of the International Council for Open and Distance Education, the Canadian Association for Distance Education and the Canadian Society for the Study of Higher Education. He also served as Vice-President of the International Baccalaureate Organisation. The best known of Sir John's 250 publications is his book Mega-Universities and Knowledge Media: Technology Strategies for Higher Education (Kogan Page, 1996).



Stamenka Uvalic is Chief of the Section for Reform, Innovation and Quality Assurance in UNESCO's Higher Education Division in Paris (2000 to the present day). She also worked as Programme Specialist in UNESCO's Centre for Higher Education – CEPES in Bucharest (1990-1999). Prior to work in UNESCO, she was Secretary-General of the Association of Universities of Former Yugoslavia. Her UNESCO experience includes responsibility for the elaboration of the 1997 Lisbon Recognition Convention; setting up the 1994 Council of Europe/UNESCO ENIC Network; the launch of the 2002 Global Forum on International Quality Assurance, Accreditation and the Recognition of Qualifications; and the 2005 Guidelines on Quality Provision in Cross Border Higher Education. She has also undertaken Higher Education Reviews of Macedonia (1994), Bosnia and Herzegovina (1996, 1997) and Yugoslavia (2001).

International courses online in practice

Internationalisation is in the core of the Bologna process. The potential of ICT adds new opportunities for internationalisation as well as for access. By integrating online courses, universities can increase their outreach and enrich their curricula with new content and pedagogical approaches. Curricula will become more interactive, more flexible and more accessible, also for international students.

In the near future, virtual Erasmus will be as normal as the physical Erasmus scheme today. However, it will not replace physical mobility but it will be a normal tool for internationalisation, involving courses at other universities, international learning communities, virtual seminars, joint project work and even virtual internships. Libraries and other knowledge sources will be naturally integrated in this process. European portals will make European on-line courses and curricula more accessible. They will describe the profile of courses in order to match them with students' careers and curricula of peer institutions.

Tutoring and services online

Online courses and curricula are increasingly implemented. They imply educational services such as tutoring, assessment, staff-student interaction and group work. In the conference, trends and best practices will be exchanged, in particular with a view on pedagogical, technological and organisational issues as well as on institutional strategies. Attention will be paid to off campus target groups which are not reached by the mainstream of European university education. By new forms of interaction and flexibility, on-line education seems to create new opportunities for off campus target groups which is not possible without an appropriate institutional policy towards them.

Open Educational Resources

Free and open educational resources (OER) are a promising movement that started at M.I.T. (1999): "free and open for educators, students, and self-learners around the world". With the support of the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation, OER are on the eve of their break-through in Europe with a second generation of open courseware. The British Open University and the Dutch Open Universiteit already launched their initiatives, OpenLearn and OpenER. EADTU and ten member institutions prepare Multilingual Open Resources for Independent Learning (MORIL).

Business models for Lifelong Open and Flexible Learning

New university business models are developed to anticipate on the trends and to take the opportunities that are being created.

Quality Assurance for international courses online

Quality assurance and quality benchmarking are needed to monitor these developments. With the support of the European Commission (Education and Culture), EADTU and 11 partners contributed to this by the creation of the E-xcellence instrument which will be further implemented in Europe by universities and quality or accreditation agencies. Specific applications and a second version will be prepared, based on recent experience and evidence.
